#### DO YOU KNOW?

## In February we celebrate several things. Do you know their beginnings? Do you know which one has been around the longest?

**Groundhog Day** - The first official Groundhog Day celebration took place on February 2, 1887, in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. It was the brainchild of local newspaper editor Clymer Freas, who sold a group of businessmen and groundhog hunters—known collectively as the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club—on the idea. (Of course, in Houston not even Phil can predict our crazy weather more than a few days out.)

**Super Bowl** - The First AFL-NFL World Championship Game in professional football, known as the Super Bowl, was played on January 15, 1967 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. The NFL champion Green Bay Packers defeated the AFL champion Kansas City Chiefs by the score of 35–10. (While not as old as Tom Brady, Packers Bart Starr was no spring chicken at 33.)

Valentine's Day, also called St. Valentine's Day, is when lovers express their affection with greetings and gifts. The holiday has origins in the Roman festival of Lupercalia held in mid-February. The festival, which celebrated the coming of spring, included fertility rites and the pairing off of women with men by lottery. At the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius I replaced Lupercalia with St. Valentine's Day. It came to be celebrated as a day of romance from about the 14th century. (How will you celebrate Valentine's Day? Whether or not you have a sweetheart, reach out to someone to let you know you are thinking about them.)

President's Day -The origin of Presidents' Day lies in the 1880s, when the birthday of Washington was first celebrated as a federal holiday. In 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Bill, which moved a number of federal holidays to Mondays. During debate on the bill, it was proposed that Washington's Birthday be renamed Presidents' Day to honor the birthdays of both Washington (February 22) and Lincoln (February 12); although Lincoln's birthday was celebrated in many states, it was never an official federal holiday. Following much discussion, Congress rejected the name change and continued to call the holiday Washington's Birthday. After the bill went into effect in 1971, however, Presidents' Day became the commonly accepted name, due in part to retailers' use of that name to promote sales and the holiday's proximity to Lincoln's birthday. (How many years did I teach students that President's Day honored Washington and Lincoln? I didn't know I was being influenced by retailers and thought I was sharing facts!)

**Black History Month** - The story of Black History Month begins in 1915. That September, the Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH), an organization dedicated to researching and promoting achievements by Black Americans and other peoples of African descent. The group sponsored a national Negro History week in 1926, choosing the second week of February to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. The event inspired schools and communities nationwide to organize local celebrations, establish history clubs and host performances and lectures.

In the decades that followed, mayors of cities across the country began issuing yearly proclamations recognizing Negro History Week. By the late 1960s, thanks in part to the civil rights movement and a growing awareness of Black identity, Negro History Week had evolved into Black History Month on many college campuses.

President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976, calling upon the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." (Take time throughout this month to learn about the amazing accomplishments of African Americans. Without all that they have achieved, our lives would be very different.)

**American Heart Month** - President Lyndon B. Johnson, among the millions of people in the country who had heart attacks, issued the first proclamation in 1964. Since then, U.S. presidents have annually declared February American Heart Month. (*Take care of your heart – eat right, take a walk, smile and reach out to someone.*)

## What Theta Lambda Means to Me Finding My Tribe

Being a member of the DKG Theta Lamba Chapter has been a wonderful experience. I can remember when Sally Kubiak invited me to my first DKG meeting as a guest in 2019; I was so excited. I was a little nervous because I did not know what to expect or what I would have to do. Even as a guest, after the meeting, I knew that I wanted to be a part of this group. I felt an immediate sense of community, support, and kindness. Something happens when you are surrounded by welcoming, friendly, knowledgeable, kind, patient, and inquisitive women who are all TEACHERS. I felt at home. I knew that the Theta Lambda group was where I wanted to be.

Professionally, I am an Adult Educator. I started teaching English to adult speakers of other languages in 2004 and believe it or not, it was almost by accident. One of my co-workers at the Cypress Creek YMCA, where I worked as the Women's Fitness Center Supervisor, mentioned that Lone Star Community College Greenspoint needed degreed English as Second Language instructors for their community enrichment program. My first reaction was "I am not a teacher nor do I know the first thing about teaching other people English!" After a lot of convincing, I submitted my resume anyway, then I was called in for an interview, ultimately got the job, and low and behold, my teaching career began.

At the end of the first semester, I decided I should get trained and learn how to properly teach adults English. I fell in love with teaching. It was not like any other kind of work I had done before, but I needed training. I enrolled in The University of Cambridge's Certificate to Teach Adults program which at the time was held at Lone Star Community College in Cypress, Texas. During that program, I learned of The School for International Training (SIT) in Brattleboro, Vermont that specialized in cultivating the best English as Second Language instructors, or so I was told. I decided right then and there, that I would attend SIT. I applied. I was accepted and before long in the summer of 2005, my children and I were headed to New England.

Once on campus, one of the things that I loved more than anything else was the sense of community. It was amazing. I was amongst people from all over the world who shared the same goal as I did. We wanted to learn how to become the best English as a Second Language instructors. We were an adventurous, gregarious, and studious bunch of "wannabe" teachers. The camaraderie that I felt at the little school on the hill will never be forgotten. It felt as if I had finally found my tribe. It has been 15 years since I left the little school on the hill. The times passed so quickly and I relish in my memories of that community. However, I have DKG Theta Lambda now.

I adore our amazing group of women educators. Thank you all for this incredible experience. It is certainly a treasure and a pleasure to be your DKG Theta Lambda sister. I have found my next level tribe.
