September 24th: National Punctuation Day



Reflections on an Italian vacation

This summer Kevin and I went to the Amalfi Coast of Italy for our vacation. We stayed in the small town of Maiori, not far from the city of Amalfi. The other vacationers in this off-the-beaten path location were mostly Italian, making it a rich cultural experience.

We usually travel without a tour group and make our way among the natives day by day. It is the kind of adventure I cherish.

Here is a story I wrote about an encounter I had with a young boy at the beach.

I have always loved rocks. Sparkly rocks, jagged rocks, and smooth rocks polished by the sea. Our day at the beach in Maiori afforded me the opportunity to really experience rocks. Mediterranean beaches seem to be lacking in shells, but are full of rocks of many sizes.

Some of the rocks that were in the water were quite large, but most of the rocks were the size that are painfully uncomfortable to walk on bare-footed. The smaller rocks would shift under my footsteps making it difficult to keep my balance. I must have looked like a very funny American trying to dodge the bigger rocks, only to find myself flailing about on the smaller ones. The finest of the rocks made for a very course sand that pretty much stuck to any bit of wet skin and annoyingly found its way into bathing suits.

Not a real fan of ocean swimming, I prefer wading at the edge of the water and walking along the beach looking for treasures. Due to the lack of sea shells, I had the great joy of rock hunting instead. I kept my eye out for very small rocks (I did have to lug them home in a suitcase, after all!). I loved the feel of the smooth pebbles in my hand as I sifted through them trying to find as many different colors as I could. I noticed an older lady was also picking up rocks. We smiled at each other and continued our individual scavenging.

After a while I sat down on the sand, digging amongst the rocks when a young boy came up to me to tell me something about a big rock that was near me. I smiled at him and told him, "non parlo italiano," because I had no idea what he was trying to tell me. He said a few more words in Italian and then went off to swim in the water.

A while later, the little boy comes back holding out his hand to me, and in halting English said, "for you" as he looked back at the older lady (whom I have decided was his grandmother). In his hand were several small pebbles, just like the ones I was collecting. I was so pleasantly surprised by his offering. I looked up and saw his grandmother smiling at us. "Grazie!" I told them.

A couple of words of Italian, a couple words of English. It really doesn't take a lot of words to communicate a lot.
